A Message from the Mayor . . .

The city of Rolling Hills is now one park larger than it was a couple of months ago. I know many have been confused by the influx of ordinances you've received in addition to normal city business. Over the course of the last year I've dug into the vacant property behind Tiverton after receiving a complaint of the deteriorating access road.

As it stood the land was owned by a developer who, even though the property sits on a floodplain, had plans to develop 70 apartment units in that area. With both Langdon and Tiverton already being heavily traveled streets, additional residences were not appealing to the commission and with negotiation a price was settled on for the city to purchase the tracts to create a park for Rolling Hills.

It was also decided that while the city had enough additional funds to purchase the property outright that it was wise to finance it, with a low rate loan, from a bond issuance from the Kentucky League of Cities. This will allow us to apply from grants, from various places, to help pay for the park without using city monies – hence all the additional paperwork you received.

There is a lot of work to do to make this land “park ready” and hope we will be able to get as many members of the community involved as we can. I truly believe this is an exciting opportunity for us to come together as a city and have a nice place to take our families and chat with our neighbors. Here Comes Fall

With Fall knocking on the door, here are a couple of things to remember . . .

1. Clean Gutters

Clean out leaves and debris from the gutters around the roof. This doesn't take long but does require a ladder and usually a second set of hands.

2. Check Windows, Roofs and Doors

Since you already have the ladder out, inspect all windows. Take a good look at your roof and even check any shingles that look loose or raised. The project takes only a few minutes but it can really help stave off bigger problems once winter hits. If you have storm windows, change them out and remove screens from your windows for winter. Look at the molding around each window and seal.

3. Get Heat Sources Ready for Winter

Early fall is a great time to beat the rush and have a heating specialist come out and look at your furnace. Or, have your chimney cleaned if you plan on using the fire place.

4. Prevent Frozen Water Spouts

Invest a few dollars and purchase outdoor water spout insulated covers. This is a cheap and quick way to help prevent frozen or burst pipes. You can pick these up any big box home repair store.

5. Clear Leaves and Brush

Clear any leaves, brush and poles from your yard, particularly around your foundation. If you've raked leaves, you can add them to your compost.

6. Mow, Weed and Feed the Lawn

Give your lawn one last time before you put away your mower for winter. A shorter lawn will be free from pests and won't provide nests for Mice and Moles during the winter.

7. Check Smoke Detectors

Did you know that smoke detectors have an expiration date? It's on the back by where the batteries go and it's a date code. As a detector ages, its ability to detect a fire decreases dramatically. Check the back of your smoke detector to see if it's more than 10 years old. When you check your expiration date be sure to check the batteries.



Additional Notes:

School is back in session and while mornings can be crazy and that we're all anxious to get home after a long day - I ask that we all please slow down and keep an extra eye out for our youngest neighbors as they make their way to and from school.

If you plan to put a large item on the curb for trash pick-up that it is necessary to call Rumpke, 502-568-3800 and let them know. If you are unable to reach them please notify Bill Bagwell, our Sanitation Commissioner, at 502-423-7388 and he will be glad to assist you. In addition, please note that if you are putting a mattress out for collection it must be wrapped in plastic or Rumpke will not take it.

If you know of anyone new to Rolling Hills please let someone on the commission know so that we can properly welcome them to the city.

If the Trick-or-Treating is like it was last year's then we can all expect ghosts and goblins to come knocking on our doors between 5-8 pm on October 31. If you're out driving please be especially careful.
